

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the West Boylston Water District of West Boylston, qualified to vote in elections and District affairs, to meet at the West Boylston Water District, 183 Worcester Street, West Boylston, in such District, on Monday the first (6th) day of June in the year of 2016 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1: To elect the following District Officers:

- (A) Moderator for one year
- (B)District clerk for one year

ARTICLE 2: To hear the report of the officers of the District and to act thereon.

- ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to transfer from any unexpended balances from the Fiscal Year 2016 appropriations or other available funds to Fiscal Year 2016 appropriation accounts, or take any action in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the District's maintenance and operating expenses budget for Fiscal Year 2017, beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2017, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to authorize the District Treasurer, with approval of the Board of Water Commissioners, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of Fiscal Year 2017, beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2017, in accordance with General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, as amended, and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws Chapter 44, Section 17as amended, or any other authority available to the District, and to authorize the District Treasurer to enter into a compensating balance agreement or agreements for Fiscal Year 2017 pursuant to General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53F, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote, pursuant to General Laws Chapter 40, Section 5C, to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds, a sum of money not to exceed five percent of receipts from rates and services of the fiscal year preceding, to the Reserve Fund said fund to provide for extraordinary or unforeseen expenditures; provided, however, that the District Treasurer shall make transfers from the Reserve Fund only by vote of the Board of Water Commissioners, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the District will vote, pursuant to General Laws Chapter 40, Section 5B, to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money not to exceed ten percent of the receipts from rates and services of the fiscal year preceding, to the Stabilization Fund, to be used, upon further appropriation, for any lawful purpose, or take any action relative thereto.

Report of the Water Commissioners

To the Citizens of The West Boylston Water District 2016

In Compliance with the laws establishing the West Boylston Water District, the Board of Water Commissioners hereby submits its 77th Annual Report.

At the annual Town Election, held on June 7, 2016, incumbent candidate James LaMountain and candidate Gary Flynn were each elected for a three year term. Also running was candidate Allen Phillips. The following results were posted:

At the Annual Meeting of the District, held on June 6, 2016, Mr. David J. Sweetman was nominated and elected to a one-year term as moderator. In addition Mr. Robert Bryngelson was nominated and elected to the position of District Clerk.

As chairman of the West Boylston Water District Commission, it gives me great pleasure to provide the District Members with the Annual Report for 2016. The West Boylston Water District continues to make significant progress in its goal to provide you with the best quality of water at the most reasonable price. The Commission has voted a minimal 2.5 percent water rate increase in 2016 to finance capital improvements. Rates had last increased by two percent in 2015. District expenses continue to rise as water system upgrades are needed on a regular basis due to the age of the system.

The District continues to focus on tightening of operating expenses while meeting its mandatory schedules for major system maintenance such as the cleaning and repairing storage reservoirs, distribution system upgrades and the upgrading of our pumping facilities. We are continuing our effort to explore potential new sources of water for the District through ongoing meetings with our Legislators, the Department of Conservation and Recreation, and the Department of Environmental Protection. The District appreciates the continuing efforts made by Senator Harriet Chandler and Representative James O'Day for their assistance in coordinating meetings with the State Agencies.

The District has made significant progress in our efforts to update our water system and provide the ratepayers with the best water quality possible. I would like to direct you to the Superintendents report for a more detailed description on the water system updates.

In closing, on behalf of the Board of Water Commissioners I would like to extend our deepest gratitude to the Superintendent, Michael Coveney, and our staff, for the continued outstanding support they provide to the District and our citizens. I would also like to thank Commissioner Val Pruneau, who retired from the Commission in 2016, for his many years of service, to both the WBWD and Pinecroft Water District, your invaluable input will be missed, but not forgotten.

SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT TO THE DISTRICT 2016

Members of the West Boylston Water District, I hereby submit to you my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent. I have had the pleasure of working for the District for fifteen years now, starting as a water operator in 2001 and becoming Superintendent in 2004. This brief report will reflect some of the issues the District has experienced through the Year of 2016.

The District continues to grow with existing developments slowly expanding over the last year including Nuha Circle on Prescott Street and the proposed Sadja Gardens in Oakdale. We also welcomed the new Cumberland Farms gas station and convenience store as a District customer.

The water consumption of the District has increased this year mostly due to a significant drought throughout the State. Congratulations to those of you who have been conserving, keep up the good work as it really does take some of the burden away from the system. Although we are pumping at or near our DEP registered withdrawal limit we still need to maintain the mandatory lawn watering restrictions, to try to stay within these limits.

The Oakdale Well continues to maintain a high level of Manganese. This element that has been occurring naturally within the ground and is one of the top priority concerns of the District. We have been limiting the use of this well to only a few hours each day to try lower the manganese levels in the system. We are also working with the DEP at their request to reduce these levels of Manganese. We have increased our monitoring to include monthly samples for Manganese at the wells, tanks and other areas of the distribution system. In addition, in June we utilized a new process of using Pantonite to clean the Oakdale well in an effort to reduce the entry of manganese into the system. Newer regulations for this element continue to be developed by the regulatory agencies and the District has been actively looking for a new source of water.

The District also contracted to clean and inspect both the Stockwell and Oakdale/Beaman St water tanks in June. The Stockwell tank was in good condition, but the Oakdale/Beaman St tank had some minor cracks in the dome that were repaired immediately by our tank contractor.

The District has taken the initiative to start upgrading many of the original electrical controls at the wells and pump stations. This will be a yearly program until all of the electrical panels are completed. In 2016 the Lee Street Well pump station was upgraded with a new 480 volt motor control center with variable frequency drive (VFD) and emergency generator connection.

We have an ongoing capital improvement program for the many aging water services and fire hydrants that could be up to 70 or more years old. There were multiple water services that were replaced in 2016 from the main to the property line of the customer. I encourage every resident to familiarize themselves with their water service and find out if it needs to be replaced by contacting us to obtain the records for your service that are on file. We also replaced several fire hydrants in 2016 with newer traffic style models that are designed to break without causing a major leak.

In the year of 2016 there were seven major water main breaks. Water breaks occurred at the following locations: on Goodale Street under Malden Brook, two crews worked all night to cut in valves on either side of the brook to isolate the break on January 19th. It took several weeks for the repairs to be complete. In March, Beaman Street at the railroad bridge. There were also breaks on Pierce Street, Prospect St and Temple St. Several service breaks were repaired also.

We are currently evaluating the breaks and looking into upgrading water mains in the areas of the system where the breaks are becoming more frequent. The District has an ongoing capital improvement plan with our consulting engineer to identify the areas in the system that need to be upgraded.

The District has completed the replacement of the Rte.12 Causeway water main with new 12 inch ductile iron and four new hydrants and several new valves. The existing 10 inch A.C. water main had experienced numerous breaks over the years and the District was able to combine this project with a major drainage project being completed by MassDOT and DCR in the same area.

The District continues to maintain a website which is always accessible for information, I encourage you to take a look at www.westboylstonwater.org for any questions that you may have. We have also set up a Facebook page in order to keep residents informed of any service issues. I also encourage residents to sign up for the CodeRED customer notification system that will notify you of any important issues.

The District has and will continue to provide a consistent high quality service to its members. We maintain three (3) wells, four (4) storage tanks, over 56 miles of pipeline ranging from a ¾ inch service up to a 16" transmission main, over 400 fire hydrants, close to 1,000 main valves and over 2600 water meters. The daily staff consists of a Superintendent, Operations Supervisor, Water Operators, and an Administrative Assistant.

The District staff has said farewell to another one of our dedicated employees. Mary Gaffney has retired from the District after working with us for 13 years. Mary has been a tremendous help to us in the billing, collections, customer service and records areas. I wish to thank her for her dedication and loyalty as an outstanding employee. From all of us at the District, we wish Mary many happy years during her retirement.

I would like to congratulate another member of the District's staff for their achievement. David Castagnetti has completed his 5th year working as a licensed water operator at the District

In conclusion I wish to thank our District Staff consisting of Robert Lopez, Joseph Carlson, David Castagnetti and Lori Renzoni. They have been a pleasure to work with and I commend them for their loyalty, dedication and professionalism. I also wish to thank the District Treasurer Heather Isaacs and the Board of Commissioners both past and present for their guidance. And mostly I want to thank you, the members of the District, for your patience, understanding and support.

WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

How much water do you use?

Are you using more water than you think? Check your bill. You may be surprised to find how much water you are using and how much money you can save if you follow some of these conservation tips. Remember every drop counts!

Saving Water Indoors

- ♠ Repair leaking faucets and toilets! If you faucet is dripping at the rate of one drop per second, you can waste 2,700 gallons per year.
- Replace your old toilet, the largest water user inside your home. The new water saving toilets use just 1.6 gallons per flush.
- Use your dishwasher and clothes washer only when you have a full load. And make sure the water level is correct for each load.
- Your clothes washer is the second largest water user in the home. Many new Energy Star rated washers also have a Water Factor at or lower than 9.5. They use 35% 50% less water and 50% less energy per load.
- Take short showers rather than baths, using a low-flow showerhead of course.
- Install low-flow faucets and fixtures.
- **b** Don't use running water to thaw meat or other frozen foods. Defrost food overnight in the refrigerator on by using the defrost setting of your microwave.
- Insulate your water pipes. You'll get hot water faster and won't waste water while it heats up.
- Store drinking water in the refrigerator. Don't let the tap run while you're waiting for cool water to flow.
- Turn off the faucet while you shave, brush your teeth or hand-wash dishes.

Saving Water Outdoors

- if you water your lawn, only do so when absolutely necessary. Lawns need only one inch of water per week from all sources. So, if there has been an inch of rain during the week, you don't need to water.
- Use mulch around trees and shrubs and in your garden beds.
- For landscaping, use native plants or those that use less water. Check with the local nursery for your best choices.
- Use an inexpensive rain gauge to measure how much rain or irrigation your yard has received.
- Adjust your sprinkler to water only your lawn and plants not the sidewalk, house or street. Don't water on windy days or in the middle of the day, to reduce the amount of water lost to evaporation.
- Use shut-off nozzles on hoses and automatic shut-off devices on irrigation systems.
- Limit your pesticide and fertilizer use. They will eventually find their way into the water supply.
